This data is submitted to WMA in the text of the Phase I MS4 Annual Reports. The acres of impervious area treated is extracted from the reports by WMA staff, multiplied by a factor of 4 to reflect pervious area, summarized as “urban acres treated” and reported as such to SSA by county.
